

RECIPE x PRESCRIPTION x RECEIPT

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A recipe /'resəpi/ refers to the set of **instructions** that tells you how to **cook** something and the ingredients you need for it.

A prescription /prɪˈskrɪpʃn/ is an official piece of paper on which a doctor writes the type of medicine you should get.

A receipt /rɪˈsiːt/ is a piece of paper that shows what you bought at a shop.

GOING TO THE CHEMIST'S

In Britain, you may **stumble across** this logo on almost every corner. When you enter,



you'll find yourself in one of the biggest chemist chains in the world. It's the kind of shop which **merges** a pharmacy and a **drugstore**. So besides getting your usual beauty products, you can collect your drugs **on prescription** (maybe you'll have to pay a **prescription charge**). Alternatively, you can buy some other drugs **over-the-counter**.
