ALL and EVERY



Don't say: Every children need love.

Say: Every child needs love. Don't say: All light was out. Say: All the lights were out.

Every is used with a singular noun. To give the same meaning, **all** is used with a plural noun. Only **all** and not every can be used **with uncountable** nouns.

*Note: the difference between all day/week...and every day/week... She was here **all day**. (= from morning to night)

She was here **every day**. (Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday...)

KISS PRINCIPLE



"Keep It Simple, Stupid." - term which simply **indicates** that the simplest solution or **path** should be taken in a situation. This principle can be **applied to** any **scenario**, including many business activities, such as planning, management, and development.

While the "stupid" line may seem a little **harsh**, it adds humor to the saying, and probably is responsible for the saying's **notoriety**.

K.I.S.S. can also stand for "keep it short and simple", which **implies** that the simplest explanation is usually the best one.
