CONSULT X DISCUSS X ASK ABOUT

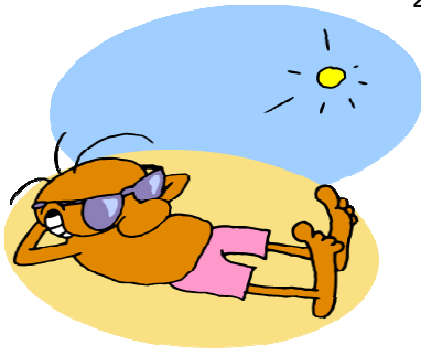


If you want to talk to someone about something (probrat něco, prodiskutovat), use the verb discuss (sth with sb) or ask (sb about sth).

To consult (sb about something) means to "poradit se", (usually with a doctor or lawyer) or look up information (mainly in files and documents). The subject is the person you are addressing or thing you are studying.
