

SO OR SUCH



We use the words **so** and **such** to emphasize the meaning of the words that follow.

Don't say: It's a lovely day. It's such warm. **Say**: It's a lovely day. It's **so warm**.

Don't say: I like Pete and Kate. They are so nice people. **Say**: I like Pete and Kate. They are **such nice people**.

!So is used after adjectives (přídavných jménech) and before *much, many, few* and *little* and **such** is used before nouns (podstatných jménech) with or without adjectives. **!**If **such** is followed by a countable noun (počitatelné podst.jm.) in singular, the indefinite article (neurčitý člen) goes between such and the noun.
