



Like and As

Don't say: She looks a bit *as* Queen Victoria.

Say: She looks a bit *like* Queen Victoria.

Like can be a preposition. We use like, not as, before a noun or pronoun to talk about similarity.

As is a conjunction. We use it before a clause and before an expression beginning with a preposition. *On Friday, as on Tuesday, the meeting will be at 8.30.*

USEFUL PHRASES

- Hey, **look at** that woman over there. Don't you think she's **the spitting image of** Gwyneth Paltrow?
- No, she doesn't **look** anything **like** Gwyneth Paltrow.
- Yes, she does. She's got **the same** hair.
- What long and blond?
- Not just that I'd **recognise** that smile anywhere.
- How often has Gwyneth Paltrow **smiled at** you?
- I've seen enough films with her in. She's got a very distinctive smile.
- It can't be her. That woman **bears** absolutely no **resemblance to** Gwyneth Paltrow.
- Oh.
- Hey, there's Mike. Hi Mike how's it going?
- Very well you'll never guess who I've been talking to.
 Well, I was just at the bar, and I saw this amazing-looking woman walking towards me. I didn't recognise her until she was right in front of me.
- Who was it?
