

TO BE WORTH



When you want to express that something is **of a special value**, use or importance you can use the phrase **to be worth**. It can be followed by a **noun**, **pronoun or a gerund**.

It's worth visiting the National Museum. The National Museum is worth visiting. The National Museum is worth a visit.

The phrase "It's (not) worth it" relates to the complete preceding sentence.

NAME DAYS IN THE CZECH REPUBLIC



Each day of the year comes with a Czech name (or names) to be celebrated. It is common to give flowers (or a gift) on a person's Name Day – you'll notice many of the flower shops around town often list name days on a blackboard outside.
