

EVENTUAL(LY) OR POSSIBLE(LY)



Don't say: In our new house I'd like to have a spare bedroom for eventual visitors.

Say: In our new house I'd like to have a spare bedroom for **possible** visitors

Don't say: I'm not sure what I'll do next year. Eventually I will go to America.

Say: I'm not sure what I'll do next year. I might go to America.

!Eventual(ly) means 'final(ly)', 'in the end', 'after all'. We use them to say that something happens after a long time or a lot of effort.

!When we want to express the idea of possibility we use 'possible', 'perhaps', 'may', 'might' etc.

HOW WE CAN POSSIBLY PAY



In advanced market economies people pay less and less **in cash**. Payment **by credit card** is becoming more usual. A lot of people, however, still use **cheque books** to pay for everything, even when the amount is small. Regular payments like electricity, gas, water, loan repyments are often done by **direct debit**.

When one travels, however, it is advisable to carry a small amount of cash. There are situations when **small change** is needed.

Travellers' cheques, eurocheques, and EU cards are a suitable and safe means of keeping money when travelling.
