SEE, LOOK and WATCH



See – vidět - is the ordinary verb to say that something 'comes to our eyes', whether or not we are paying attention

Did you **see** the article about the strike in today's paper?

Look (at) –koukat na- is used to talk about concentrating, paying attention, trying to see what is there. You can only look at something deliberately (záměrně).

He **looked at** her with his eyes full of love.

Watch –dívat se- is like look at, but suggests that something is happening or going to happen.

Watch that man – I want to know everything he does.
