IDIOM	BASIC MEANING	EXPLANATION
to be at the helm	To be in charge of a project or company	If you are at the helm, you control the direction and speed of the ship / company
to show / learn the ropes	To show the operating procedures of a company	A ship requires many ropes to function properly, just like a company needs many procedures. We show (teach) these to new team members
to pull on the same rope	Working together for the same goal	To be effective and to work together, towards the same goal; the companys success
to walk the plank	Being punished for something (not always your fault)	A favorite method of pirates to execute prisoners. They would have people walk on a plank of wood and make them walk to the edge and fall into the sea
sinking ship	A failing company or project	If a ship is sinking it is going down and it means it is in trouble
to run a tight ship	To keep a project or company very organized	If all the ropes were tight, it meant the ship would sail smoothly and that there were no problems for the ship to sail smoothly
abandon ship	To leave a project or company when it is in trouble	If a ship was on fire or sinking, the captain would scream sabandon ship! to the crew, because it wasnusafe to stay onboard, the crew would then get off
