IF CLAUSES – 2ND CONDITIONAL

Don't say: "If I would see a fire, I would call **firemen**."

Say: "If I saw a fire, I would call firemen."

Use *if + past* to talk about hypothetical future and
would + verb to talk about consequences.

T: What would you if you had a **contagious disease**?

E: I would definitely report it to our company doctor.

E: No, I would get out of the building through the **emergency exit** without panic.

T: Excellent! Now, what if there was someone **injured**?

E: In that case, I would **aid** that person and **seek prompt medical attention**.

E: Hm, I would hide and call the police.
