

TOO and VERY



Too means 'more than enough', more than necessary or 'more than is wanted'

He's **too intelligent** for his class – he isn't learning anything. **Very** means 'a lot' and it intensifies the meaning of the adjectives (přídavných jmen) and adverbs (příslovcí) that follow. He's a **very intelligent** child.

!Too is used before adjectives and adverbs, before nouns we use **too much**.

I've got **too much work**.

LOST IN TOWN

Bob: Excuse me. Could you please help me? I came out for a walk from my hotel and I've got myself completely lost.

Passer-by: Well, I'm **more or less** going that way anyway. If you come with me, I can show you where to go **once** we get to King.

Bob: Thank you very much! That's **very kind** of you. I just hope that I won't bother you **too much**.
