Don't say: Lucie came in my office and sat down. Say: Lucie came **into** my office and sat down.

! In denotes position <u>inside something</u>, while **into** denotes <u>motion or direction towards the inside of something</u>.

USEFUL PHRASES FOR GIVING DIRECTIONS



HOW TO ASK? Can you tell me where the library is? Can you tell me how to get to the airport? Which way is the hotel, please?

PUBLIC TRANSPORT: Take the Green Line to Central Station.

Transfer to the Red Line. Get off at Market Station. Go out exit number 4.

FOOT OR CAR: Go down Main Street to Broadway. Turn left and it's on your right.

<u>CAR:</u> Take the coastal highway. Take the Westminister **turn off**. **Go over/Take** the Alex Fraser Bridge. **Go through** (Take) the Massey Tunnel. <u>OTHER PHRASES:</u> You can't miss it. I'm lost. Right in front of you. It's on the second floor.
