Say: "I was at the University of Economics."

In the school is used when we talk about the type of school. We use **at the school** when we talk about the name of the school.

S: Well, I was educated in different types of schools. First I went to elementary school in my home town, Rochester. After that I was in **grammar school** in the town nearby.
