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order / .d r/ is a verb meaning to ask for something to be made, delivered, or supplied. Usually we order food at a restaurant or we can order something online.

Make / schedule an appointment / p nt.m nt/ is a phrasal verb meaning to reserve a time at a service with another person. Usually at a doctor, hair salon, bank etc.
