GIVE and PUT



Don't say: Give the vegetables into the fridge.

Say: Put the vegetables into the fridge.

Don't say: I have put the file to Cathy.

Say: I have given the file to Cathy.

!We use **give** when we want to say that somebody gives something to somebody, whereas we say put when we want to say that we put something somewhere.
