

UNLESS

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Don't say: "Unless he didn't speed, he wouldn't cause an accident."

Say: "Unless he speeded, he wouldn't cause an accident."

We use **unless** in conditional sentences. It means **if not** and it is followed by a positive verb.



ACCIDENT

R – Richard, E – Elen

R: Hi Elen, have you heard what happened to Roger?

E: Hi Richard, no, anything serious?

R: Yes. He had an accident last night. Right now he is staying in hospital in the **intensive care** department. He has **concussion**. But don't worry, the doctors said he would **recover** soon.

E: Oh no! And how did that happen?

R: He **breached driving rules**. Unless he had **speeded**, he wouldn't have **caused** an accident.

E: That sounds crazy. Didn't he drive the speed limit? Was there anyone else **injured**?

R: No, luckily not. But he hit another car in front of him when **taking it over**.

E: That's horrible! When did it happen?

R: It was during **rush hour** – at 5 p.m. when everyone was going home from work.

E: I am really sorry to hear that. When is it possible to visit Roger in the hospital?

R: Well, I am going to see him today after work. You can join me.

E: Fine!
